Sermon Recap:

Standing Firm Together

I. Agreeing in the Lord (v.2-3)

Paul gives specific instructions to two individuals that have practical implications for the whole church.

a. Conflict

- Euodia and Syntyche were in conflict with one another. We do not know what the issue was, but there was division in the Philippian church between these two.
- Division in the church is never acceptable. We do not have to be uniform, but we are created, called, and converted to be unified.
- John Macarthur, "Believers are belong to the same Lord, and are those one with each other. Therefore anything that denies our oneness with each other denies our oneness with Him."

b. Resolution

- A "true companion" is called to reconcile the division.
- Disunity left unchecked presents a poor witness to the world.
- Looking to the interest of others, in humility, forgive and resolve broken relationships, displaying the gospel to the world

II. Rejoicing in the Lord (v.4-7)

"Rejoice in the Lord always," is a command. We do not "catch" joy, but we choose to practice joy as a fruit of the Spirit.

a. Cause

- If we ever fail to find a reason for joy, Paul provides cause enough. We rejoice "in the Lord."
- If we have nothing else, but we have Christ, we have reason to choose joy.

b. Compassion

- The same Christ that gives us joy gives us a reasonable and gentle spirit.
- We do not grumble or complain for our own way, but do all things without grumbling, in joy.

c. Confidence

- Our reason for joy is also our reason for confidence.
- Christ has redeemed us. He will finish the work he began. He will one day glorify us.
- If he has the power to meet our greatest need, be confident (not anxious) that he can care for you.
- That confidence creates peace that guards our heart and mind from anxiety.

III. Wisdom in the Lord (v.8-9)

a. Focus

• To ensure peace, we focus on the things that are true, honorable, just, pure, commendable, excellent, and worthy of praise.

b. Practice

- Paul has provided practical and theological instruction in this letter. To have wisdom means we practice what he can exhorted us to do.
 - Be unified, standing firm together.
 - Choose to rejoice in the Lord always.
 - Refocus out life on what is true, honorable, just, pure, lovely, commendable, and worthy of praise.
 - Deny the negative thieves of joy.

Discussion Questions:

- Read Romans 12:16, 14:19, 15:5; 1 Corinthians 1:10; Ephesians 4:3; 1 Peter 3:8. How important is it for believers to maintain unity? What can be done to improve relationships?
- What are the commands Paul gives in 4:4-6? How are they related to the character, presence, and promises of God?
- What does Paul's repeated command to "rejoice" tell us about the kind of joy he has in mind? Is this a feeling, emotion, action, or other?
- Read Matthew 6:19-34. What truths can you see that are crucial for ending anxiety?
- What truths about God should cause us to reject worry?
- How can we promote joy in our lives?
- What does 4:8 tell us about our thoughts? How can we shape and direct them?

Application:

- Our society in anxiety-ridden. What areas of your life do you face anxiety? How can you better lift those cries up to the Lord in confidence?
- Do you intentionally choose to focus your thoughts according to 4:8? How can Scripture help you in reorienting your live to more positive, Godly, Christ-exalting ways?
- What "thieves of joy" are present in your life? Speak to a brother or sister about these struggles and formulate a plan together to eliminate them.
