Sermon Recap:

Purposes & Promises

The Bible is not mainly about us; the Bible is mainly about God. You exist for God's purposes. God's providence over the events of Moses' life make that clear.

I. Lessons Learned

a. Choose This Day Who You Will Serve

- Between v.10-11 we jump forty years into the future.
- God has brought Moses to a crossroads: on one side is Egypt and the life he has known; on the
 other side is Israel, his heritage and people.
- Moses "went out to look upon his people," choosing to forsake his past and identify with the Hebrews.
- We must consciously choose to identify with God's people, even when it causes us pain and suffering.

b. Your Sins Will Find You Out

- Seeing an Israelite being beat, Moses intervenes, murders the attacker, and hides the body.
- "God wanted to make sure that his people would be saved for his glory." Salvation comes by the mighty arm of God, not the frail hand of man.
- Word had spread and Moses actions were know. He was now...
 - A fugitive hunted by Pharaoh.
 - A man rejected by his own people.
- "Your sins will find you out" (Numbers 32:23. You must repent and deal with sin in Christ alone.

c. Pride Comes Before the Fall

- Moses' actions exhibited a proud heart: choosing autonomy, attempting to save God's people in his time, in his way.
- · Autonomy, pride, and self-sufficiency are simply a reflection of our self-love and self-idolatry.
- "Pride goes before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall" (Proverbs 16:18).
- Moses fells and fled to Midian where he was taught empathy and humility.
- D.L. Moody, "Moses spent the first 40 years thinking he was somebody. He spent the second forty
 years learning he was a nobody. He spent his third 40 years discovering what God can do with a
 nobody."
- These 40 years in Midian were not wasted, they were sanctifying him for the last forty when he
 would lead and shepherd God's people through the wilderness to freedom.
- Just as God is the center of Moses' story, he is the center of your story.

II. Promises Remembered

- Pharaoh has died and been replaced, but Israel still suffers, groans, and cries out to God.
- He hears, He sees, and He knows.
- He "remembers"- This does not imply that God has forgotten, rather, that is he ready to act on his promises.
- He prepared Moses for Israel; He has prepared Jesus Christ for you.

Discussion Questions:

- What choice does Moses have to make in v.11? Do you think that was an easy choice? Why or why not?
- What can we learn about Moses from his defense of his oppressed brother?
- · Was Moses' actions right?
- How is his heart revealed in those actions?
- What is the danger of that heart?
- What was the result of those actions?
- What did Moses learn in Midian? How did his life in Egypt contrast with his life in Midian?
- · What was God doing in Moses' life in this passage?
- How was he specifically prepared for the last 40 years of his life?
- · How did God respond to Israel's cries and groans?

Application:

- Do you find yourself living in both "worlds?" Are there areas of your life where you are living or trusting in the old way of living before faith?
- Do you have hidden sins today? Find a trusted brother or sister in the church, confess those sins in repentance, and pray together, asking for forgiveness.
- Is your life marked by empathy and humility? How can you cultivate those traits? Ask a trusted brother or sister in the church (or spouse) if they witness these traits in you and how you may improve upon them?
- How is the truth of Christ as Deliverer real to you today?
